New Ideas for Old Buildings

On November 5th, we spoke at the 'New Ideas for Old Buildings' conference in York, hosted by the <u>Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings</u> and the <u>Sustainable Traditional Buildings Alliance</u>. The conference's dual emphases on building conservation and environmental sustainability align strongly with the Transforming Homes GTE's aims and ethos, providing an opportunity to present our developing research to a knowledgeable and varied audience.

In our presentation we introduced the project and summarised three key elements of our research. Firstly, the historic development and design influences of interwar housing. Secondly, the research we have undertaken to inform proposals for the demonstration homes in Swansea, focusing on the benefits of using bio-based materials. Finally, the opportunities and design challenges emerging as we develop wider scalable, transferable proposals for interwar housing across the UK.

It was inspiring to hear excellent presentations, meet diverse people from the design and construction industries, and learn about innovative projects revitalising traditional buildings. We look forward to continuing these discussions and exploring potential collaborations.

Launching our Community Co-Design Charrettes

On Thursday, November 14th, Prof Pete Walker, Dr Steve Coombs, Dr Lucy McFadzean, Joel Cady and I led a co-design charrette in East Anglia. This was the first in a series of interactive workshops with residents of the more than 1 million houses built by councils in England and Wales during the interwar period. The charrettes will inform the development of a catalogue of design solutions to transform homes of this type across the UK.

During the event, residents made models of their homes and discussed how these spaces, built over 100 years ago, work for them today. Participants then reimagined their homes, testing ideas to make them great places to live for another 100 years. Our team was inspired by the residents' innovative design ideas and gained valuable insights into what their homes are like and how they use them.

This charrette was made possible not only by the Transforming Homes team but also by local organisations that helped engage residents and facilitate the event, and the residents themselves. As our research continues to evolve, we are excited to integrate these insights into design solutions that will help transform homes into even better places to live.
